WE SEEK OUT BETTER WAYS TO DO THINGS

In August we presented an extraordinary mid-scale show featuring trial bikes, parkour and beautiful choreographed physical ensemble sequences by Justice in Motion, developed at 101 Outdoor Arts. The project spoke about County Lines knife crime and aimed to reach out to teenagers and young adults with its powerful message. We supported the participation of four local young people who learnt physical theatre and parkour skills enabling them to perform with the company in the show. We worked with local community associations to stage the performances in communities which have faced challenges with anti-social behaviour in order to reach young people affected by these issues.

Making Music, Making Friends

We proudly delivered several of these intergenerational projects this year. Monthly sessions connect a class of primary school children with a group of older people, who then participate together in fun music and singing sessions. As part of our Ageing Creatively programme these sessions consistently leave a lasting impact, proving to be deeply meaningful experiences across generations, promoting mutual understanding and appreciation.

WE ARE PASSIONATE ABOUT THE ARTS

Youth Theatre

Over 150 local young people, aged 14 to 19, have taken part in weekly sessions with professional theatre practitioners this year, making new friends and learning new performance skills. Our Youth Theatre supports young people in building confidence and self-esteem as well as teaching communication and presentation skills and the importance of commitment, teamwork and empathy. This year our Infant and Junior Youth Theatre worked with professional theatre makers to present a large scale production of *The Wizard of Oz* on the Corn Exchange stage.

We have seen first-hand the positive benefits of engaging young people with arts and cultural learning and celebrating their talents and we're committed to providing bursaries to ensure the sessions are open to all.

'I am so glad I didn't quit drama. The show was the best thing I've ever done and it felt amazing. I'm going to be in every show, every year until I'm a grown up and then I'm going to be an actor.'

Co-commissioning

This year we are delighted to have co-commissioned If You Fall presented by Ad Infinitum – a show about care, love and the end of our lives - and Boy on the Roof, presented by Vamos Theatre, the UK's leading full mask theatre company, a story of an unlikely friendship where acceptance, understanding and love find their way to centre stage.

We are proud to support these companies to present these ambitious shows and since developing these relationships we have helped these companies build loyal audiences in Newbury.

WE PUT OUR AUDIENCES AND **PARTICIPANTS**

Creative Art Journaling: Young Minds

These sessions provide a visual safe place for young people to acquire skills to express themselves and help them through challenging times. Led by a professional artist, Creative Art Journaling connects with young people's mental health to help them explore, articulate and manage their emotions through creative activity. This year we delivered 8 six week courses, with 80% reporting that they felt more able to attend school and 90% saying that the sessions had helped them manage emotions or behaviour.

'Y (who usually prefers to communicate non verbally) nodded throughout Deborah's personal story & even spoke to her at the end...their teacher commented how amazed she was that he had done this as he rarely says a word to anyone. He also stayed the longest and did not want to go because he wanted to finish his page.'

Panto Pay it Forwards

Thanks to our donors and funders, the second year of our Panto Pay it Forwards appeal raised over £9,600 and provided free Beauty and the Beast tickets to 238 school children and 317 vulnerable adults and families who otherwise would not have been able to see the magic of panto.

'It meant that children who would not normally have had access to an experience like going to the theatre were able to come and join us. We could celebrate as a community and no child felt that they had been left out or that it was an experience that they couldn't quite afford.'

Singing for Recovery

These sessions have a focus on wellbeing and use vocal warm-ups, singing techniques and group singing to promote relaxation and enjoyment in a friendly environment. Aiming to help build the confidence needed for recovery through singing with support and guidance from a professional singer, feedback from participants show that these sessions have been really impactful.

Mo and the Red Ribbon

This year we brought this incredible large-scale outdoor performance by French company L'Homme Debout (The Standing Man) to Newbury, which attracted over 3,000 people to the town centre. The performance moved the audience through the streets telling the story of a child refugee, Mo, who had arrived in Newbury in search of their family. The epic sequences and stunning visual images entranced audiences. Larger than life moments of interaction included fire pots dispersed along the high street, 200 giant balloons bouncing above peoples' heads and a montage of digital projects in a spectacular finale.

WE AIM FOR EXCELLENCE

Take it Outside

This year saw the launch of our Jerwood Foundation funded Take it Outside programme at 101 Outdoor Arts, an artist development scheme aimed at supporting extraordinary early-career artists, typically with less than ten years of professional practice, that are aiming to develop work for outdoors and public space. Through this scheme, we are supporting artists to lead innovation and artform development over the next decade, creating work of international quality for outdoor contexts.

'I'm currently immersed in the Take It Outside Residency at 101, and the support I've received thus far has been nothing short of incredible. 101 stands out for its uniquely warm atmosphere. fostered by its cross-disciplinary approach to performance. Beyond being a facility that has gifted me a new scale of experimentation, 101 embodies a vibrant community, enriched by its dedicated staff and the ethos that defines it. Through the Take It Outside residency at 101, as well as engagements with (101 designer maker event) Shedonism I've found myself opening up to a world of collaboration with technicians and performers. It's an exhilarating journey, and I'm eager to explore where this influx of new skills and conversations will lead my work."

Museum of the Moon

For three weeks over the summer we took the seats out of our auditorium to hang Luke Jerram's world class Museum of the Moon installation. Working in partnership with Visit Newbury, over 19,000 visitors came to see the installation, many of whom had never been to the Corn Exchange before. Almost 500 people also took part in experiences under the Moon, including Storytime under the Moon for young families, Adult and Family Tai Chi, Adult and Family Yoga, Gong Bath and Restorative Yoga and Sound Healing.

WE WORK COLLABORATIVELY

Careers in the Arts

A joint project between the Corn Exchange Newbury and The Watermill Theatre, funded by Greenham Trust. which sets out to inspire and educate young people aged 14 to 25 in what a career in the arts can and does look like. The project aims to help young people to feel confident about pursuing a career in the arts, to change the assumption that performing is their only option, and to put a spotlight on the many other opportunities in the creative industries that can range from marketing, planning and fundraising to the designing, making and running of shows and events. So far we have engaged with over 4,260 young people as part of this project.

Listening with Your Eyes

Our partnership with West Berkshire Adult Social Care and Vamos Theatre provides the Listening with Your Eyes communication training sessions to council care staff across all council run residential and day centre settings in West Berkshire - teaching confidence in reaching and connecting with people living with dementia. The training offers tools and techniques to support good practice in person-centred care including empathy, deep listening, insight, and trust; encouraging positive communication without words that is physical, honest, clear and caring. This year we have trained over 50 council employees.

OLD LIBRARY

This year we launched our fundraising campaign to redevelop the Old Library in Newbury town centre to become a new arts hub and permanent home to our creative participation activity.

Greenham Trust have purchased the building on our behalf and we have secured planning permission to redevelop this empty town centre heritage building, originally opened as a Carnegie library in 1906. Exterior work and weather proofing have been completed with interior construction to begin once sufficient funding has been secured. Once complete the transformed Old Library will provide a permanent home for our engagement activities with two dedicated engagement spaces, one of which will be a flexible performance space, and a café bar. Our creative participation activities provide a lifeline to many local

people: reducing social isolation and loneliness within our community; improving mental health locally; and supporting young people in building confidence and self-esteem. The Old Library will be the perfect new home for this area of our work.

As we go to print in February 2025 we are continuing our fundraising campaign and hope to begin interior construction work very shortly.





